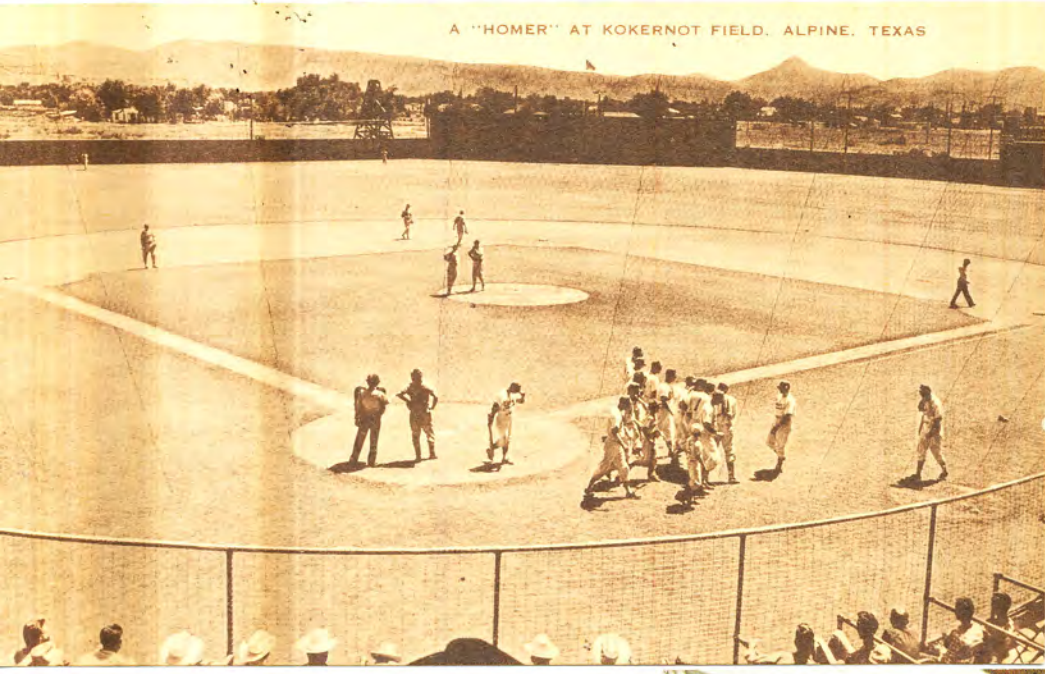
Family Going to Camp

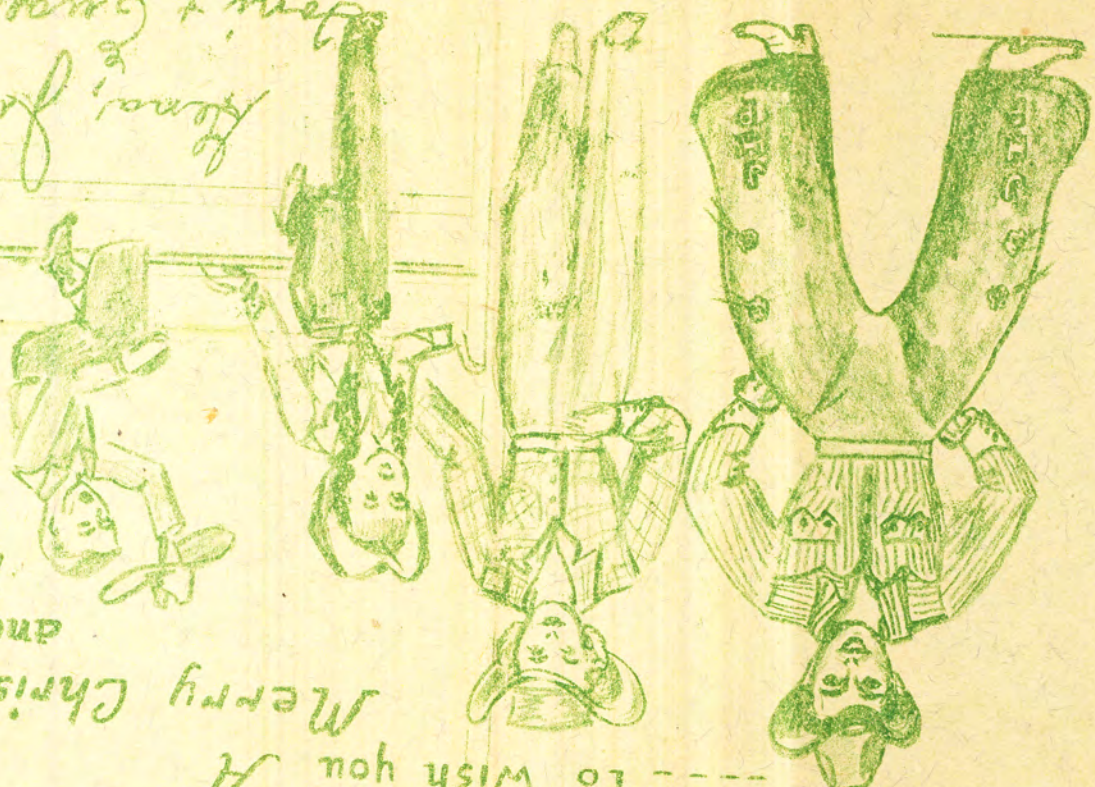

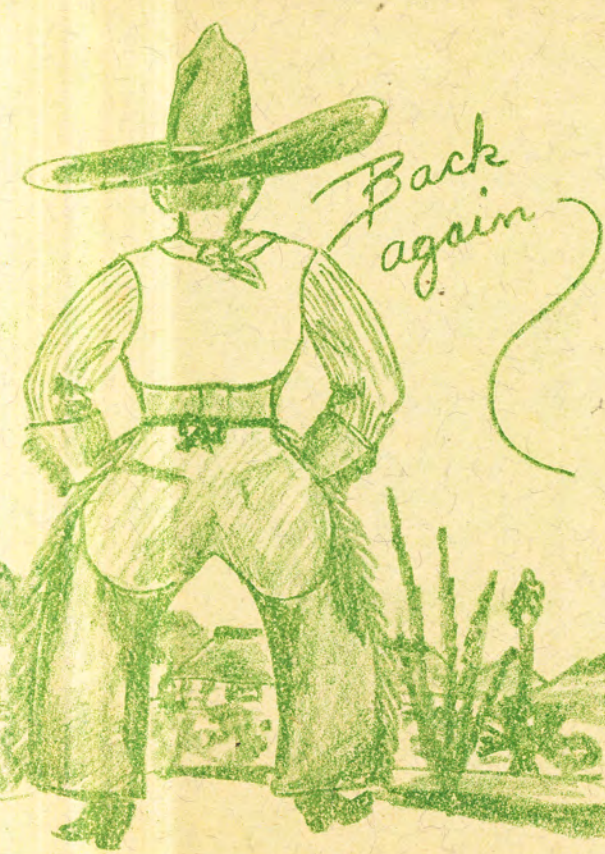

Dear Mom And Pop

Just a line to let you know all the happenings of the past week. "It never rains but what it pours" is really true here. Peggy-Anne's cold started to clear up and then I caught it. I managed to break it right away but it started working in my chest and caused just what I'd been keeping my fingers crossed wouldn't happen this time. Saturday night, Electa, Mrs. Penn and Ollie and I were sitting in the living room talking and I said I was cold so Ollie lit the fire. I was still cold and so I put on my flannel bath robe over my dress, and still couldn't get warm. Then all of a sudden I got terrifically hot and I knew what was happening. Too much milk again and it evidently wasn't being all drawn out even though I'd been watching carefully, I ~~thought~~, this time. So I called Dr. Lockhart and explained the symptoms over the phone. He had Ollie come to his house and gave him some pills that were pain-killers -- some suppha-diazene pills--and instructions on how to take them. Also a bottle of penecillin, and then he called up his nurse (Registered) and they couldn't locate her right away, so it was 2 A.M. before she arrived to give me my first shot. She came back every three hours until 11 A.M. and then another nurse took over for the remainder of the shots. Dr. Lockhart came over in the morning and I was feeling so much better that it was uncanny. The lumps went out of my breast (same one as last time), the fever had left and I was feeling pretty good again. He continued the shots until the bottle was gone and even drew pictures on my hips so that Ollie could give the shots if I needed more. He's pretty considerate. The shots are \$2.00 apiece so he said Ollie should learn to give them to me. I think Ollie was secretly praying that I wouldn't need any more for he said he'd had enough shots given him in the army that he didn't relish the idea of shooting anyone, himself. I don't blame him for I don't think I could do it.

On top of this Oliver 2 caught the cold we'd tried so hard to shield him from. He doesn't feel like eating much at a time which means feeding him every 2½ to 3 hours. He's fussy of course and likes to be held and we hold him for he makes us feel so bad to have that little head all stuffed up. Mrs. Lockhart stopped in to order some stationary and borrow another book from the library and looked at him and decided that Dr. Lockhart should send over some nosedrops so the Drugstore brought them to me and they do help a lot. He's asleep now so I thought I'd get this off to you.

We didn't forget that Sunday is Mother's Day but what we ordered hasn't arrived yet so it will be late. We ordered the same for you, Mom, and Mom T., and just hope you like it as well as I do. Ha! Ha!. Guess that will keep you guessing for a few days. We hope you have a lovely day Mom and just wish you were here to help spoil this boy. Even P.A. is spoiling him-- shaking all his new rattles for him. She covers him when he kicks them off-- puts his booties on when he kicks them off-- and yesterday she got her steps and proceeded to pat him on the back to get him to sleep-- she got tired after while and called Josephine to finish the job.

Just finished hand-writing 290 formal invitations for Mrs. Barnes. Got \$3.50 for it. Not bad?

I think that was the first time Josephine had touched him and I guess she'd been wanting to do something for him and didn't have the nerve to ask. She's a sweet girl and Peggy just thinks she's grand. One morning when I'd had a particularly hard night with the baby and dozed off just before Ollie got up, she came in, gave Peggy her breakfast when she woke up, dressed her, washed the dishes and was well into the diapers when I awoke. It's wonderful to have stumbled onto someone so responsible. Electa has her do her dresses and blouses and dust the huge hall that runs the length of our house and then pays me for her time. We've given up two days of her time for she gets through early otherwise and loses time that way. Mrs. Davis is using her on Tuesdays and Thursdays until Mrs. Rogers gets back from Grand Rapids, Mich., where she's been sent as a delegate from the Texas Women's Presbyterial Society. Too bad, the Meyman's weren't different types of people, I'd write to them so they could say hello if they were in Grand Rapids while she is there. But no soap! I wish they'd been having it in Cleveland instead.

Ollie is really swamped with mimeograph work and finally I've discovered a use for all that art work I took in school. I draw cartoons, pictures, and letter on them when it's necessary and we are making a name for ourselves in that line. Bill and Freda Powell who bought Mitre Peak Guest Ranch had us do some four-page advertising for them and I drew the Mountain on the top from a post card. They are Gibson's daughter and the son-in-law who was in the Pacific for so long. It's really fun to get back to drawing once more and to find a real use for it. I'll enclose a couple of our regular weekly jobs. We do 600 copies each week. Oh! Yes! I'd better explain that Alpine had built a regular ball-park stadium and all- with the result that all the out of town team come here to play instead of the Alpine team travelling. And we've been winning every game so far. I want to get to one soon for I hear they are good.

Ollie went over to Marfa with Mr. Davis yesterday and solicited enough printing business to bring us in about \$100.00 in three months. That's the kind of printing where all he does is take the order and send it off. It all takes work though and he must be a pretty good salesman.

I'm not answering your letters here but will say that we received your money-order and the order to Montgomery Wards had been sent for the buggy, mattress, and a baby scales and the 20.00 covers it all. Thanks a million. Seeing as how we only have two steps out the back door I've been walking around the yard enjoying the roses and eating mulberries off the trees and when the buggy comes I'll go for a walk up town. I'm feeling real good today and now that I've had my siege with my breasts I'm not anticipating any more troubles. Dr. Lockhart says --"No more complications, Please" He's really kept hoping and this business of doing his operating in Marfa till his Hospital is through is really getting him tired out.

Well, Mom and Pop, I'm going to close for now and try to get a note off to Mom T. I hope you get this letter for Mothers Day, Mom and Pop He's a redhead all right but it's not going to be carrot red just a nice auburn red. He looks just like that picture of Peggy-Anne taken on top of the dining room table by Mr. MacMaster.

Loads of love to both of you from the four of us. Doesn't that sound funny. Sometime soon I'm going to write a list of everything he's received and it will take a couple of pages. Even a cotton sweater from Marg. and Bob Douglas. LOVE- Peg

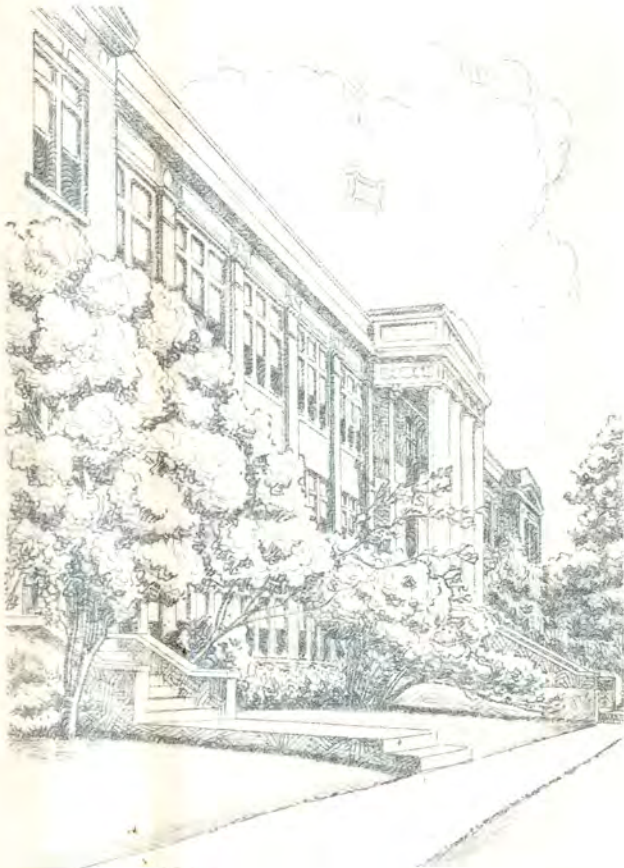

Concert Band

REED: Commissioned for the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Tri-State Music Festival at Enid, Oklahoma, this work has come to regarded as one of Alfred Reed's most brilliant and powerful works. The music is built entirely from one main theme and two fanfare-like figures.

GRAINGER: Better known as "Londonderry Air", this tune was published in Dublin in 1895.

"CASTLE GAP": Castle Gap is a mountain pass near Rankin, Texas, a point on the early wagon train and stage coach routes. This march depicts in general effect the strength and vigor of the pioneers. It was written on commission from the Rankin High School Band.

"PROCESSION OF NOBLES": This work is a movement taken from a suite which Rimsky-Korsakov drew from his opera "Mlada". While originally written for orchestra (with strings) it is admirably suited for band, employing fanfare and pomp of the brasses.

"VARIATIONS ON A KOREAN FOLK SONG": This set of variations is one of Mr. Chance's latest works for band.

"COMMANDO MARCH": First published in 1943, this march is in honor of the American servicemen known by this name. Mr. Barber is one of the foremost American composers of our century. He is a native of Westchester, Pennsylvania, and has been the winner of two Pulitzer Prizes and the American Prixdomo.

"CARIBBEAN FANTASY": Mr. Morrissey lives in Louisiana and has written a number of works utilizing Latin American rhythms.

"COMEDIAN'S GALLOP": "The Comedians", a suite for small orchestra, was written in 1910. This movement is based on the continuing drive of the galloping motive. One can easily imagine riding a galloping horse throughout the score.

TARVER: Spanish adventurers who returned home after exploring most regions of the New World were known as "The Conquerors". This march is meant to portray these bold and daring men.

LEONARD: These movements have been called miniature tone poems, like unto pen and pencil sketches hung casually on a wall.

BILIK: Using familiar melodies such as "Listen to the Mockingbird", "Dixie", "When Johnny Comes Marching Home", and "Battle Hymn of the Republic", Jerry Bilik tells the story of a nation that was plunged into a civil war which neither side really won. From the first sounds of "John Brown's Body" to the tumultuous battle the tension mounts, and after the brief encounter the music slowly builds in grandeur to a grand finale.

WILLIAMS: Clifton Williams is on the music faculty at the University of Texas. He conducted the premier of this work by the Strategic Air Command Band in 1963. It has since been performed on all S.A.C. band concerts.

Mr. Laird has made a thorough study of the fossils which occur in the Portersville shale and has independently formulated valid generalizations with regard to living conditions in Portersville lime and the significance of these fossils to field geologists. He presented the results of this investigation at the annual meeting of the Ohio Academy of Science. Mr. Laird has demonstrated the same energy, resourcefulness and scientific integrity in other projects. In one of these he is investigating the effectiveness of different methods of instruction in general geology.

Out of a scholarship memorial fund donated by the class of '31, a scholarship is annually presented to a member of the junior class. He is selected by a committee consisting of the President and the Dean of the College and officers of the class of 1931, on the basis of distinction in scholarship, and extra-curricular activities.



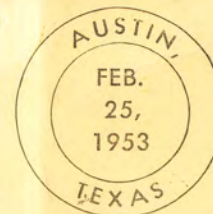

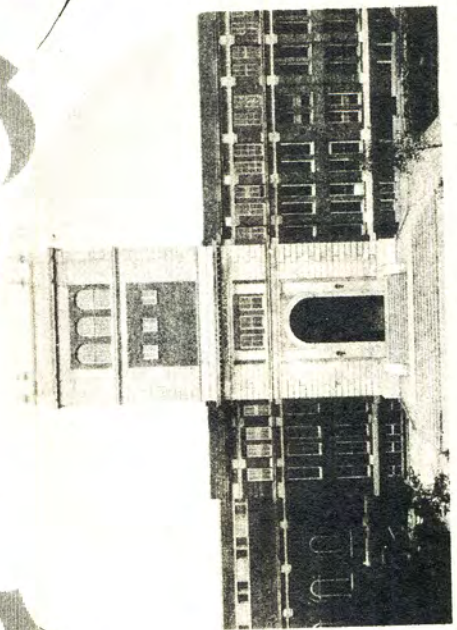

Mrs. McCollum was hostess and served dainty sandwiches, cakes and hot punch.





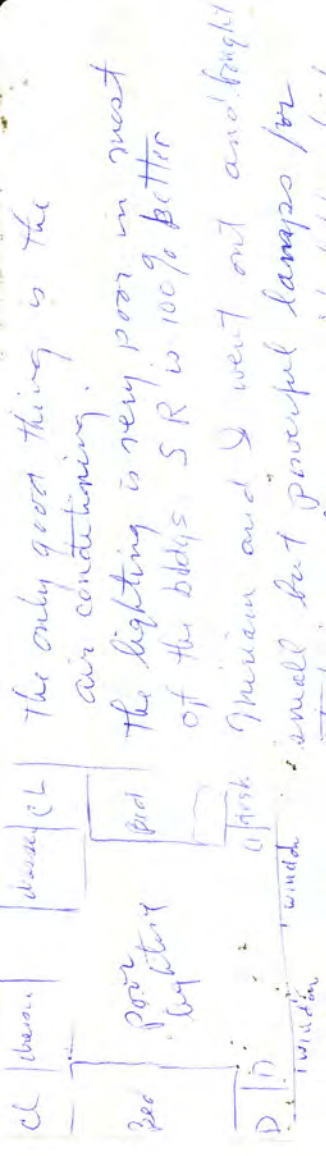

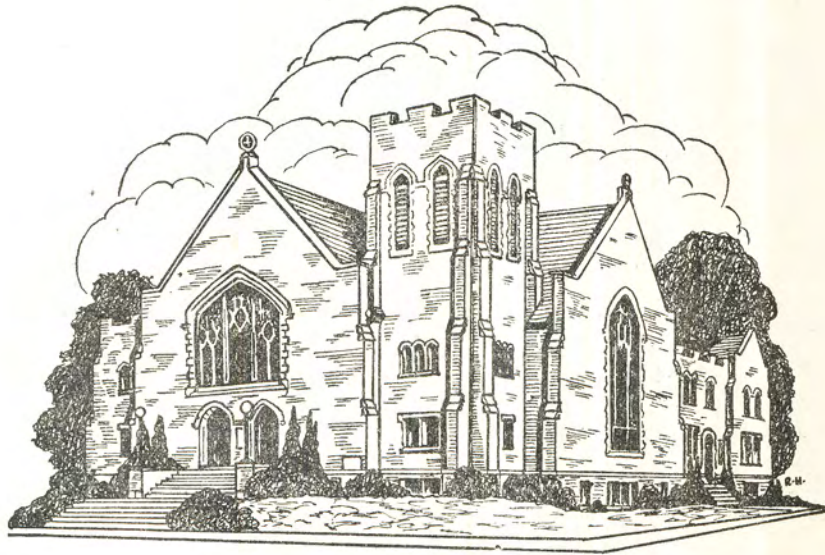
