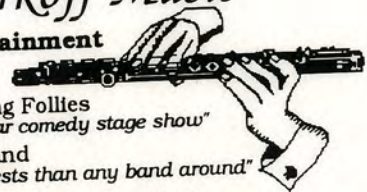

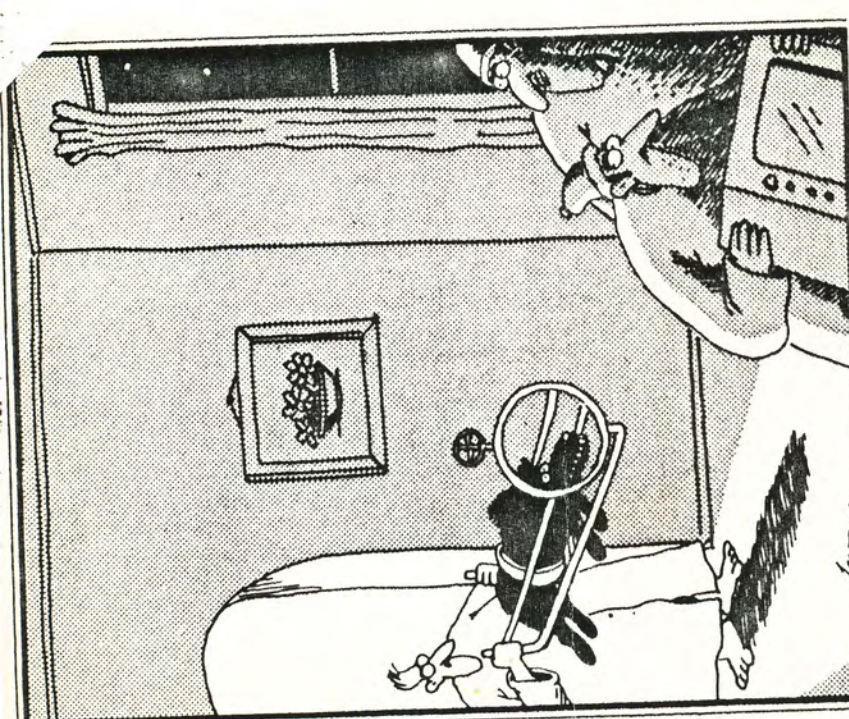

At McDonald Observatory---

Laser Beam To Figure Earth-Moon Distance

AUSTIN (Staff) —If all goes as planned, one of the longest and most accurate "rulers" in existence will be used July 20 in an attempt to measure, within inches, the distance from the earth to the moon.

The ruler is actually a laser beam that will be bounced off a reflector to be placed on the moon's surface by Apollo 11 astronauts Neil A. Armstrong and Edwin E. Aldrin, Jr.

Instruments for generating the laser beams are now being installed at The University of Texas McDonald Observatory atop Mount Locke in West Texas. Cooperating in the experiment are the NASA Goddard Space Flight Center and the University of Maryland.

Scientists have long ap-

preciated the remarkable things that could be done if a laser beam could range on a specific target on the moon," said Dr. Harlan Smith, chairman of the Astronomy Department at UT Austin and director of astronomy research at McDonald Observatory.

"With NASA support, a project group now headed by Prof. C. Alley of Maryland has been planning the experiment for several years," he said.

The measurements to be taken at McDonald Observatory, and later by other such stations throughout the world, will help determine not only the earth-moon distance but also the extent of lunar librations (the slow apparent swinging of the visible portion of the moon causing areas at the edges to be alternately visible and hidden), the lunar radius fluctuation in the earth's rotation rate on its axis, the wobble of the earth's axis, and the intercontinental drift rate (how fast North America is drifting away from the Eurasian continent).

Although July 20 may mark the first successful use of a laser for such purposes, it will not be the last, for the experiment is expected to continue almost daily for at least the next eight years.

Johnnie Floyd, research associate in the UT Astronomy Department, pointed out that The University of Texas was asked to participate in the project because "McDonald's new 107-inch telescope, built with NASA support, is probably the

best suited in the world for such work."

The University also has available an existing project group which is completing construction of the new telescope, Floyd said, "and UT Austin researchers have other observational programs compatible with the experiment."

The reflector, officially known as a laser ranging retro-reflector, consists of an array of 100 cylindrical cavities, each containing a retro-reflecting prism that will bounce the laser light back along the same path it took coming from earth.

The beam of light will take the entire round trip in approximately 2.5 seconds. When the exact travel time is ascertained to within a billionth of a second, the scientists — knowing the speed of light — will be able to calculate the distance traveled.

The telescope at McDonald to help keep the instruments on earth and the reflector on moon lined up for approximately 30 minutes while a measurement is made.


Among factors to be fed into the computer will be the earth's rotation, the refraction of light through the earth's atmosphere, the wobble of the Earth on its axis, the movements of the moon and the expected location of the reflector.

Even after the computer has digested that information and is pointing the telescope in the general area of the reflector, the human eye will be used to center the telescope on a known landmark.

The computer will then move the telescope from the known landmark on the moon's surface to point at the reflector and continue making necessary corrections in keeping all instruments lined up.

The importance of the experiment, the simplicity of the reflector as a passive receiver-transmitter and the ease with which it can be moved were considered in choosing the laser project as one of the key experiments for the Apollo 11 mission.



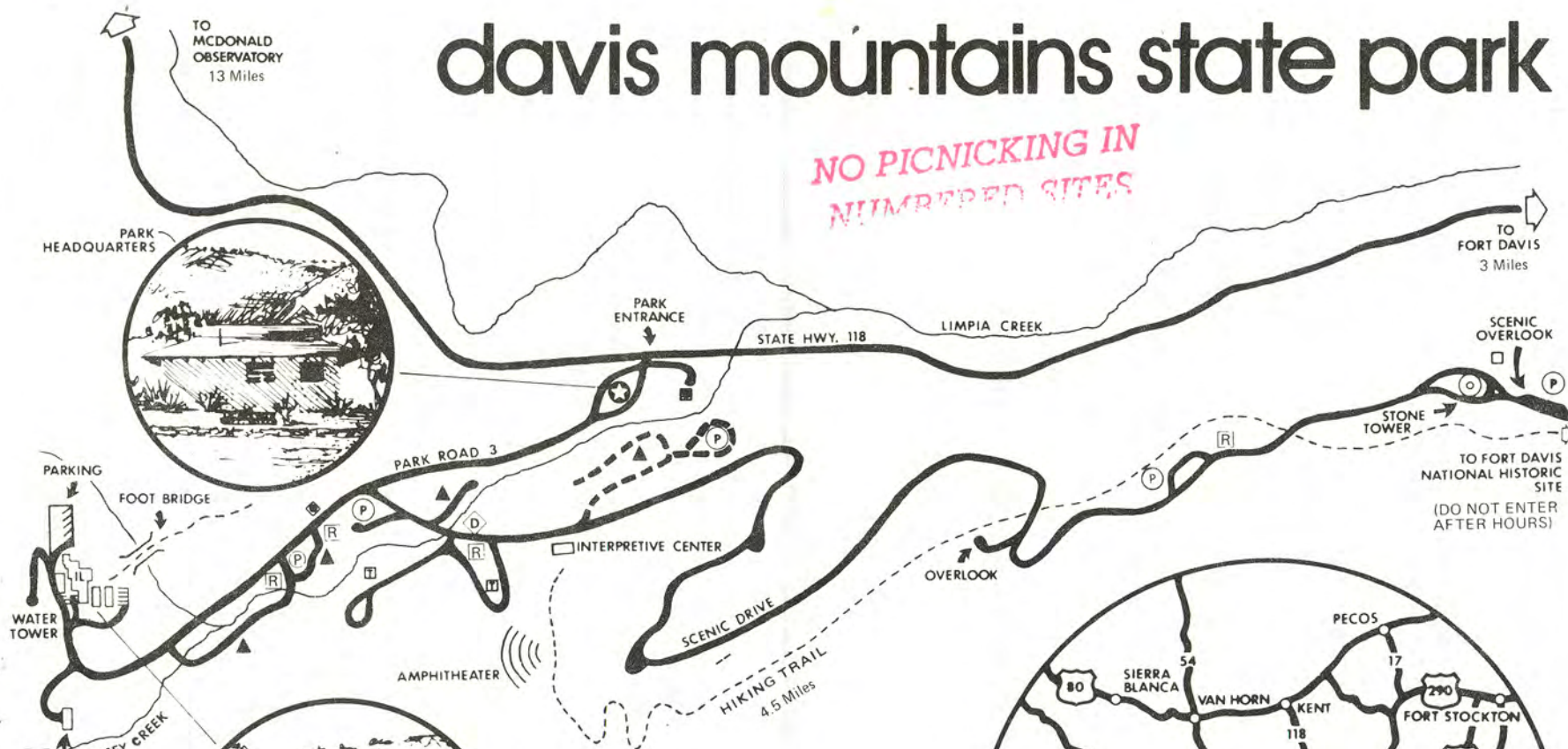

DAVIS MOUNTAINS STATE PARK — INDIAN LODGE

The park is located in the Davis Mountains approximately four miles west of Fort Davis, Texas on State Highway 118. An elevation of 4,900-5,500 feet provides mild winters and cool summers. Average annual temperature is 63 degrees with average rainfall of 19 inches.

Facilities

The park has picnic sites, campsites with water, tables and grills, multi-use sites with electricity and water, and trailer sites with full hookups. Modern comfort stations with hot showers are conveniently located throughout the park. Hiking trails, Skyline drive, campfire programs during the summer and an Interpretive Center open to the public from June through August complete the facilities list for the park. The park is open all year. For campsite reservations call 915/426-3337.

ENTRANCE FEES - \$2.00 per day per vehicle unless visitor has an Annual or Restricted Annual Entrance Permit or a Parklands Passport. Restricted Annual has to be for Davis Mountains State Park.

CAMPING RATES - \$6.00 for a regular campsite; \$9.00 for an electrical site; and \$10.00 for a full hook-up site.

NOTE: Please obtain a camping permit at Headquarters BEFORE occupying a site. (If office is closed stop the next morning and pay for camping.)

Indian Lodge, located in the park and operated by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, is a 39-unit pueblo style hotel with excellent restaurant facilities. All rooms have air conditioning, TV, and telephone. A heated swimming pool is available. Indian Lodge is closed for two weeks beginning the second Monday in January. Daily room rates as follows: single — \$30.00; double — \$35.00; double with two beds — \$40.00; room 121 (suite size with two double beds) — \$45.00. Each additional adult — \$5.00; each additional child 6 to 12 — \$2.00; under 6 — free. Cribs, roll-a-ways and room service are not available. For reservations write: Indian Lodge, P.O. Box 786, Fort Davis, Texas 79734. Telephone: 915/426-3254.

Old Fort Davis

Established in 1854. Purchased by the Federal Government in 1963 and presently administered by the National Park Service. Admission \$1 per vehicle.

McDonald Observatory

Approximately 13 miles from the park. Located on Mount Locke, 6,791 feet above sea level. Visitors are welcome with guided tours provided during the day.

Scenic Drive

74 miles in length with such attractions as McDonald Observatory, Madera Canyon roadside park, Bloys Church Camp in Skillman Grove, Points of Rocks and the historic town of Fort Davis.

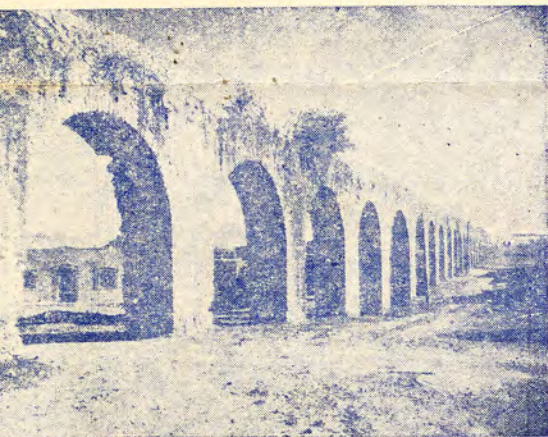
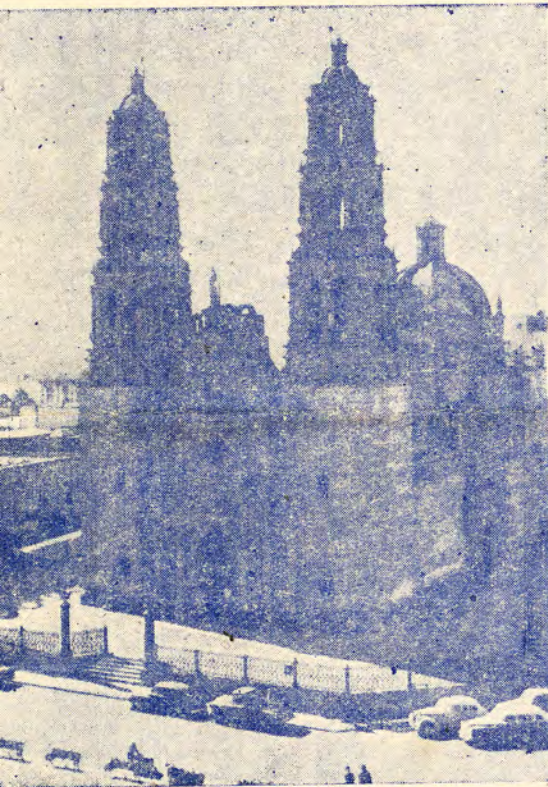

FOSTER PARENT MANUAL

Ector County Children's Services

THE LOCAL AGENCY

Ector County Children's Service became affiliated with the Texas State Department of Public Welfare in October, 1970. The agency serves to help children in Ector County who need protective services because of neglect, abandonment, abuse and other circumstances that would deem a child dependent on the public for support and protection. An advisory board of local citizens appointed by the Commissioners Court administers the budget allocated by that Court.

Among the services offered by our department are (1) counseling to families with children in their own homes; (2) counseling with parents whose children have been placed in foster care voluntarily or involuntarily; (3) counseling with unwed mothers regarding possible placement of the unborn child; (4) placement of children in institutions or adoptive homes when that is the best plan.

LEGAL CUSTODY

Ector County Children's Service, DPW Unit 10, has temporary or permanent legal custody of the child while he is in foster care. Plans for the child's future are made by the caseworker, and some of these plans may be shared with you so that you may help prepare the child for his new placement; however, the foster parent in no way makes decisions regarding the child's future.

WHY FOSTER HOMES

Foster homes serve as temporary placement for children waiting for adoption, or removal to an institution and for those who will be returning to their own homes. Foster parents help provide some of the loving care and understanding needed to guide the child back to his own home or to his new home in an institution or adoptive placement.

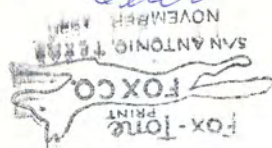


